
A Reading from the Book of First Samuel

In this Hebrew scripture story, the Lord sends Samuel to anoint David to be the new king over Israel. As so often happens in the Bible, one who seems least likely in the eyes of others is chosen by God to carry out the divine will.

The Lord said to Samuel, "I have rejected Saul from being king over Israel. Fill your horn with oil and set out; I will send you to Jesse of Bethlehem, for I have provided for myself a king among his sons. I will show you what you shall do; and you shall anoint for me the one whom I name to you." Samuel did what the Lord commanded, and came to Bethlehem. Jesse brought his sons to Samuel, who looked on the first, Eliab. The Lord said to Samuel, "Do not look on his appearance or on the height of his stature, because I have rejected him; for the Lord does not see as mortals see; they look on the outward appearance, but the Lord looks on the heart." Jesse called Abinadab, and made him pass before Samuel, who said, "The Lord has not chosen this one." Jesse made Shammah pass by and Samuel again said, "Neither has the Lord chosen this one." Jesse made seven of his sons pass before Samuel, and all were not chosen by the Lord. "Are all your sons here?" asked Samuel. Jesse replied, "There remains yet the youngest, but he is keeping the sheep; I will send for him." Now he he was ruddy, and had beautiful eyes, and was handsome. The Lord said, "Rise and anoint him; for this is the one." Then Samuel took the horn of oil, and anointed him in the presence of his brothers; and the spirit of the Lord came mightily upon David from that day forward. Samuel then set out and went to Ramah.

Surely your goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in the house of the LORD for ever. R.

A Reading from Paul's Epistle to the Ephesians

In this New Testament lesson, disciples are called to be a people of the light, forsaking all the works of darkness.

Once you were darkness, but now in the Lord you are light. Live as children of light— for the fruit of the light is found in all that is good and right and true. Try to find out what is pleasing to the Lord. Take no part in the unfruitful works of darkness, but instead expose them. For it is shameful even to mention what such people do secretly; but everything exposed by the light becomes visible, for everything that becomes visible is light. Therefore it says, "Sleeper, awake! Rise from the dead, and Christ will shine on you."

The Holy Gospel of our Lord, Jesus Christ, according to John.

Glory to you, Lord Christ.

As Jesus walked along in Galilee, he saw a man blind from birth. His disciples asked him, "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?" Jesus answered, "Neither this man nor his parents sinned; he was born blind so that God's works might be revealed in him. We must work the works of him who sent me while it is day; night is coming when no one can work. As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world." Jesus spat on the ground and made mud with the saliva and spread the mud on the man's eyes, saying to him, "Go, wash in the pool of Siloam." Siloam means 'sent'. The man washed and came back able to see.

The neighbors and those who had seen him before as a beggar began to ask, "Is this not the man who used to sit and beg?" Some were saying, "It is he." Others were saying, "No, but it is someone like him." He kept saying, "I am the man." His neighbors were astonished. "Then how were your eyes opened?" He answered, "The man called Jesus made mud, spread it on my eyes, and said to me, 'Go to Siloam and wash.' Then I went and washed and received my sight."

Now it was a sabbath day when Jesus made the mud and opened the man's eyes. So the people brought him to the Pharisees, who also asked him how he had regained his sight. He said to them, "He put mud on my eyes. Then I washed, and now I see." Some of the Pharisees said, "Aha! This Jesus is not from God, for he does not observe the sabbath." But others said, "How can a man who is a sinner perform such signs?" Because they were divided about who Jesus was and what he had done, they asked the man directly. "What is your opinion about him? After all, it was your eyes he opened." The man who could now see said, "He is a prophet."

The Pharisees, still unable to understand, went to the man's parents. "Is this your son, who you say was born blind? How then does he now see?" They answered, "We know that this is our son, and that he was born blind; but we do not know how it is that he sees, nor do we know who opened his eyes. Ask him; he is of age. He will speak for himself."

So for the second time the Pharisees summoned the man who had been born blind. "Testify and give glory to God! We know that this Jesus is a sinner. What did he do to you? How did he open your eyes?" Frustrated and annoyed, he answered, "I do not know whether he is a sinner. One thing I do know: I was blind, and now I see. I have told you already, and you would not listen. Why do you want to hear it again? Do you also want to become his disciples?" Then they reviled him, saying, "We are disciples of Moses; you must be his disciple. God has spoken to Moses, but as for this Jesus, we do not know where he comes from." "Here is an astonishing thing!" said the man. "You do not know where he comes from, and yet he opened my eyes. Never since the world began has it been heard that anyone opened the eyes of a person born blind. If this man were not from God, he could do nothing." Indignant, the Pharisees snarled at him, "You were born entirely in sins, and are you trying to teach us?" By force, they drove him out of the village.

Jesus heard that they had cast him out. He looked for him, and when he found him, he said, "Do you believe in the Son of Man?" He answered, "And who is he, sir? Tell me, so that I may believe in him." Jesus said to him, "You have seen him, and the one speaking with you is he." He said, "Lord, I believe." - and he worshiped him. Jesus said, "I came into this world for judgment, so that those who do not see may see, and those who think they see may become blind."

Holy Communion


