THE WORD OF GOD


Blessed be God: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. And blessed be God's kingdom, now and forever. Amen.

Almighty God our heavenly Father, you declare your glory and show forth your handiwork in the heavens and in the earth: Deliver us in our various occupations from the service of self alone, that we may do the work you give us to do in truth and beauty and for the common good; for the sake of him who came among us as one who serves, your Son Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

The people are seated.

A Reading from the Book of Ecclesiastes

The writer of this book of wisdom literature reminds us that work should give our lives meaning and fulfillment in addition to material gain.

What gain have the workers from their toil? I have seen the business that God has given to everyone to be busy with. He has made everything suitable for its time; moreover, he has put a sense of past and future into their minds, yet they cannot find out what God has done from the beginning to the end. I know that there is nothing better for them than to be happy and enjoy themselves as long as they live; moreover, it is God's gift that all should eat and drink and take pleasure in all their toil.

The Word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

Psalm 107 is sung to the tune of Hymn #457, St. James. All remain seated.

Give thanks to God, our gracious Lord, whose mercy ever stands; Proclaim that God has brought us safe from our oppressors' hands.

Some wandered in the desert wastes and found no place to stay; As thirst and hunger troubled them, their spirits ebbed away.

When they cried out in their distress, God listened to their prayer And toward a city turned their feet so they could settle there.

Let them give thanks for God's great love, compassion, wondrous deeds; When those who thirst and hunger come, God satisfies their needs.

Give glory to the Father, Son, and Spirit equally; As from the first it was, is now, and evermore shall be.

A Reading from Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians

Paul, author of First Corinthians, uses an analogy to building construction that the stronger the foundation, the more enduring will be the result; Jesus Christ being the most enduring foundation of all.

According to the grace of God given to me, like a skilled master builder I laid a foundation, and someone else is building on it. Each builder must choose with care how to build on it. For no one can lay any foundation other than the one that has been laid; that foundation is Jesus Christ. Now if anyone builds on the foundation with gold, silver, precious stones, wood, hay, straw—the work of each builder will become visible, for the Day will disclose it, because it will be revealed with fire, and the fire will test what sort of work each has done. If what has been built on the foundation survives, the builder will receive a reward.

Alleluia, alleluia! Give thanks to the risen Lord. Alleluia, alleluia! Give praise to his Name. Spread the good news o'er all the earth: Jesus has died and has risen.

The Holy Gospel of our Lord, Jesus Christ, according to Matthew. Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus said, 'Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also. No one can serve two masters; for a slave will either hate the one and love the other, or be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth.

We pray also for the forgiveness of our sins. Silence is kept, then all pray together:

Have mercy upon us; Most merciful God, in your compassion forgive us our sins, known and unknown things done and left undone, and so uphold us by your Spirit that we may live and serve you in newness of life, to the honor and glory of your Name; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Loving God, through your Son you gave us an example of how to love one another and how to embody this love in labor to serve the poor and the oppressed. Give us the strength to continue working to bring forth your kingdom here on earth— a kingdom of justice and peace, where all know compassion, grace and mercy. We pray through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.
