A Reading from the Book of Jonah

In our Hebrew scripture lesson, the prophet Jonah, following his ordeal in the belly of a great fish, receives a second summons to the city of Ninevah. In response to Ninevah's turn of heart, God determines not to destroy the city.

The word of the Lord came to Jonah a second time, saying, "Get up, go to Nineveh, that great city, and proclaim to it the message that I tell you." So Jonah set out and went to Nineveh, according to the word of the Lord. Now Nineveh was an exceedingly large city, a three days' walk across. Jonah began to go into the city, going a day's walk. And he cried out, "Forty days more, and Nineveh shall be overthrown!" And the people of Nineveh believed God; they proclaimed a fast, and everyone, great and small, put on sackcloth. When God saw what they did, how they turned from their evil ways, God changed his mind about the calamity that he had said he would bring upon them; and he did not do it.

In Psalm 62, God is a rock and shelter. The people are to trust in God.



For God alone my soul in silence waits; truly, my hope is in him. He alone is my rock and my salvation, my stronghold, so that I shall not be shaken. **R.** In God is my safety and my honor; God is my strong rock and my refuge. Put your trust in him always, O people, pour out your hearts before him, for God is our refuge. **R.** Those of high degree are but a fleeting breath, even those of low estate cannot be trusted. On the scales they are lighter than a breath, all of them together. **R.** Put no trust in extortion; in robbery take no empty pride; though wealth increase, set not your heart upon it. God has spoken once, twice have I heard it, that power belongs to God. Steadfast love is yours, O Lord, for you repay everyone according to his deeds. **R.**

A Reading from Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians

In our epistle lesson, Paul encourages the Corinthians to manage their temporal affairs in light of eternal realities. It was thought by Paul and the early Christian communities that the time of the Lord's return was near.

I mean, brothers and sisters, the appointed time has grown short; from now on, let even those who have wives be as though they had none, and those who rejoice as though they were not rejoicing, and those who buy as though they had no possessions, and those who deal with the world as though they had no dealings with it. For the present form of this world is passing away.

The Word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

Respond, ye souls in endless rest, ye patriarchs and prophets blest, Alleluia, alleluia! Ye holy twelve, ye martyrs strong, all saints triumphant, raise the song: Alleluia! (5x)

The Holy Gospel of our Lord, Jesus Christ, according to Mark. Glory to you, Lord Christ.

After John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God, and saying, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news." As Jesus passed along the Sea of Galilee, he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting a net into the sea—for they were fishermen. And Jesus said to them, "Follow me and I will make you fish for people." And immediately they left their nets and followed him. As he went a little farther, he saw James, son of Zebedee, and his brother John, who were in their boat mending the nets. Immediately he called them; and they left their father Zebedee in the boat with the hired men, and followed him.

What Do We Believe?

By the good news of our salvation brought to Mary by the angel, hear us: Lord, grant us peace.

By the mystery of the Word made flesh, hear us: Lord, grant us peace.

By the birth in time of the timeless Son of God, hear us: Lord, grant us peace.

By the manifestation of the King of glory to the shepherds and magi, hear us: Lord, grant us peace.

By the baptism of the Son of God in the river Jordan, hear us: Lord, grant us peace.

By Jesus' call to follow him in faith, hear us: Lord, grant us peace.

May the kingdoms of this world may become the kingdom of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, hear us:

Amen.


Holy Communion

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give God thanks and praise.


It is with joy that we give you thanks and praise, summoning Lord, ... and all the company of heaven, singing the hymn of your unending praise:
