A Reading from the Prophet Amos

lin our opening reading, the prophet denounces corruption and injustice, but offers hope to those who seek the Lord and love good.

Seek the Lord and live, or he will break out against the house of Joseph like fire, and it will devour Bethel, with no one to quench it. Ah, you that turn justice to wormwood, and bring righteousness to the ground! You hate the one who reproves in the gate, and you abhor the one who speaks the truth. Because you trample on the poor and take from them levies of grain, you shall not live in your houses built from stone; you shall not drink the wine of your pleasant vineyards. For I know how many are your transgressions, and how great are your sins—you who afflict the righteous, who take a bribe, and push aside the needy in the gate. Seek good and not evil, that you may live; hate evil and love good, and establish justice in the gate; and so the Lord, the God of hosts, will be with you. If you do this, it may be that the Lord, the God of hosts, will turn and be gracious to the remnant of Joseph.

The Word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

In Psalm 90, the psalmist reflects on the passing character of human life and asks God for wisdom in making use of time. The cantor sings the refrain; all repeat; and sing as indicated by **R**.



So teach us to number our days that we may apply our hearts to wisdom. Return, O Lord, how long will you Tarry? Be gracious to your servants. R. Satisfy us by your loving-kindness in the morning; so shall we rejoice and be glad all the days of our life. Make us glad by the measure of the days that you afflicted us and the years in which we suffered adversity. R. Show your servants your works and your splendor to their children. May the graciousness of the Lord our God be upon us; prosper the work of our hands; prosper our handiwork. R.

A Reading from the Letter to the Hebrews

This reading reminds us that the Lord's word is active, probing the human heart and all creation. We can boldly approach God's throne because Jesus has known our weaknesses and temptations.

The word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing until it divides soul from spirit, joints from marrow; it is able to judge the thoughts and intentions of the heart. Before God no creature is hidden, but all are naked and laid bare to the eyes of the one to whom we must render an account. Yet through the merits of grace we have a great high priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus, the Son of God. So let us hold fast to our confession. For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who in every respect has been tested as we are, yet without sin. Let us therefore approach the throne of grace with boldness, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need.

The Holy Gospel of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, according to Mark. Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus was setting out on a journey, and suddenly a man ran up and knelt before him, and asked him, "Good Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus said, "Why do you call me good? No one is good but God alone. You know the commandments: 'You shall not murder; You shall not commit adultery; You shall not steal; You shall not bear false witness; You shall not defraud; Honor your father and mother.'" The man replied, "Teacher, I have kept all these since my youth." Jesus, gazing thoughtfully at him, said, "You lack one thing; go, sell what you own, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." When the man heard this, he was shocked and went away grieving, for he had many possessions. Jesus spoke to his disciples, "How hard it will be for those who have wealth to enter the kingdom of God!" The disciples were perplexed at these words. Jesus said to them again, "Children, how hard it is to enter the kingdom of God! It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God." They were greatly astounded and said to one another, "Then who can be saved?" Jesus looked carefully at them and said, "For mortals it is impossible, but not for God; for God all things are possible."

Our Affirmation of Faith - What do we believe?

For those who are lonely, sick, hungry, persecuted, or ignored, that the Lord will comfort and sustain them, let us pray to the Lord. R.


