THE WORD OF GOD


Blessed be God: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. And blessed be God's kingdom, now and forever. Amen.

A Reading From The Prophet Micah

Our opening lesson presents an ancient prophecy which foresees the day when a new ruler shall come forth for Israel out of David's city, Bethlehem.

The prophet said, "You, O Bethlehem of Ephrathah, who are one of the little clans of Judah, from you shall come forth for me one who is to rule in Israel, whose origin is from of old, from ancient days. Therefore he shall give them up until the time when she who is in labor has brought forth; then the rest of his kindred shall return to the people of Israel. And he shall stand and feed his flock in the strength of the Lord, in the majesty of the name of the Lord his God. And they shall live secure, for now he shall be great to the ends of the earth, and he shall be the one of peace."

A Reading From The Letter To The Hebrews

This New Testament reading describes the purpose of Jesus' coming into the world – to make an offering in his body for our sanctification.

When Christ came into the world, he said, "Sacrifices and offerings you have not desired, but a body you have prepared for me; in burnt offerings and sin offerings you have taken no pleasure. Then I said, 'See, God, I have come to do your will, O God'(in the scroll of the book it is written of me)."When he said above, "You have neither desired nor taken pleasure in sacrifices and offerings and burnt offerings and sin offerings" (these are offered according to the law), then he added, "See, I have come to do your will." He abolishes the first in order to establish the second. And it is by God's will that we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all.

He has brought down the powerful from their thrones and lifted up the lowly; he has filled the hungry with good things and sent the rich away empty. He has helped his servant Israel, in remembrance of his mercy, according to the promise he made to our ancestors, to Abraham and to his descendants forever."

Cantor: Heaven and earth are full of your glory.




Cantor: Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

Hymn 56: O Come, O Come, Emmanuel -- Veni Emmanuel

The ringing of the Angelus commemorates Gabriel's visit to Mary and the angels who announced Jesus' birth. The bell is rung three times, and all pray silently, "Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with you. Blessed are you among all people, and blessed is your son, Jesus". This is repeated twice more and concludes with nine strokes of the bell.
