

THE WORD OF GOD

Blessed be God: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. And blessed be God's kingdom, now and forever. Amen. Almighty God, to you all hearts are open, all desires known, and from you no secrets are hid: Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy Name, through Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Trisagion is sung once by the cantor, then twice by all.



The Lord be with you. And also with you. Let us pray.

Almighty God, you have built your Church upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ himself being the chief cornerstone: Grant us so to be joined together in unity of spirit by their teaching, that we may be made a holy temple acceptable to you; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever.

A Reading from the Wisdom of Solomon

In our first lesson, the author of the Wisdom of Solomon meditates on the fact of death in a world created by a loving God.

God did not make death, and he does not delight in the death of the living. For he created all things so that they might exist; the generative forces of the world are wholesome, and there is no destructive poison in them, and the dominion of Hades is not on earth. For righteousness is immortal. God created us for incorruption, and made us in the image of his own eternity, but through the devil's envy death entered the world, and those who belong to his company experience it.

Psalm 30 is a hymn of praise and thanksgiving by one whom the Lord has saved from death. The cantor sings the refrain; all repeat, and sing as indicated by **R**.

A Reading from the Second Letter to the Corinthians

In this New Testament lesson, the apostle Paul encourages the Corinthians to be generous in their contributions to a collection he has been gathering for the relief of the church in Jerusalem.

As you excel in everything— in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in utmost eagerness, and in our love for you— so we want you to excel also in this generous undertaking. I do not say this as a command, but I am testing the genuineness of your love against the earnestness of others. For you know the generous act of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that by his poverty you might become rich. For if the eagerness is there, the gift is acceptable according to what one has— not according to what one does not have. I do not mean that there should be relief for others and pressure on you, but it is a question of a fair balance between your present abundance and their need, so that their abundance may be for your need, in order that there may be a fair balance. As it is written, "The one who had much did not have too much, and the one who had little did not have too little."

The Holy Gospel of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, according to Mark. Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus crossed again to the other side of the sea, and a great crowd gathered around him. Then one of the leaders of the synagogue named Jairus came and, when he saw him, fell at his feet and begged him repeatedly, "My little daughter is at the point of death. Come and lay your hands on her, so that she may be made well, and live." So Jesus went with him. And a large crowd followed him and pressed in on him. Now there was a woman who had been suffering from hemorrhages for twelve years. She had endured much under many physicians and had spent all that she had; and she was no better, but rather grew worse. She had heard about Jesus, and came up behind him in the crowd and touched his cloak, thinking, 'If I but touch his clothes, I will be made well.' Immediately her hemorrhage stopped; and she felt in her body that she was healed of her disease. Jesus quickly felt that power had gone forth from him. He said, "Who touched my clothes?" His disciples replied, "With such a crowd pressing in on you; how will you know who touched you?" Still he searched to see who had done it. So the woman, knowing what had happened, came in fear and trembling, fell down before him, and told him the whole truth. "Daughter," Jesus said, "Your faith has made you well; go in peace, and be healed of your disease."

No sooner had he spoken then people arrived with news that the synagogue leader's daughter was dead, and that Jesus should not bother to come. Jesus overheard them. So he said to the leader, "Do not fear, only believe." When they came to the house, he saw a commotion, people weeping and wailing loudly. He entered and said, "Why do you make a

commotion and weep? The child is not dead but sleeping." They laughed at him. He put them outside, took the child's father and mother and those who were with him, and went in where the child was. Taking her by the hand, he said "Talitha cum," which means, "Little girl, get up!" Immediately the girl, who was twelve, got up and began to walk about. Those who saw her were overcome with amazement. He strictly ordered everyone not to talk about this, and told them to give her something to eat.

Our Affirmation of Faith - What do we believe?

May God's peace be with you always. And also with you. The people may greet each other briefly.


HOLY COMMUNION
